




Mushu's missing. Maybe he won't be by the time you read this – I have hope – but, for now,

> Mushu is a cat, a flame point Siamese. I can't remember precise details, but I think he's roughly 14.

My daughters, little girls when Mushu was born, developed a PowerPoint presentation to advocate for cat-acquisition. It was cute, clever and unconvincing to a cat-curmudgeon like me. I didn't want Mushu, or any representative of his ilk – I had no history with or affinity for cats - but my wife and kids, to my angered surprise, made a clandestine trip to a breeder and brought a faded-ocher fur-ball home, and my vote was rendered moot.

Time passed, and I fell in love. Deeply so.

Mushu makes me laugh. He pays attention to me and he ignores me. He demands that I hold him, until he almost-cruelly and with icy disconnect – leaps off my lap and pads away. Some nights - most - he nestles on my chest when I finally lie down for sleep, and his purring - loud, throaty and uncontrolled - fills the otherwise-silent darkened space. When my bed was rendered empty, Mushu recognized my pain and reminded me that I'm not

We declared kitten-Mushu to be an "indoor cat." At times, he had a different opinion of himself. At our house on Spring Marsh Lane, he taught himself to open the door to the garage. The first time he went missing, I panicked, until I noticed the door was ajar.

> Too quick to blame - one of my worst character defects - I chided my wife for carelessness and, eventually, found Mushu curled up underneath our most-recently-run car. Weeks, if not months, passed before we caught Mushu redpawed. Every inch of his body was stretched as he balanced on his hind legs and pulled down on the lever-handle, releasing the door from its jamb. We were dumbfounded, mesmerized, and wholly amused. The truth was revealed: The culprit wasn't an absent-minded spouse, faulty mechanics, or an unnamed ghost; but a clever, agile and mischievous cat.

The door problem got trickier with time. He



learned to nudge it closed with his nose after sneaking out. On such occasions, we failed to consider that he might be in the garage. When the automatic doors rose from the concrete floor, Mushu would run out into the driveway. Sometimes we noticed. Sometimes not. Several of the not-noticed times led to frantic distress. In hindsight, it feels like I traipsed through neighboring yards, sometimes desperate in the dark, at least once a week for a year.

We never abandoned our searches, cooing "Moooo-shoo," in forced falsetto, as if cats are somehow soprano fans. Once, I found him hiding in a sewer drain. Another time, I spotted an unnaturally light dot against the spring green marsh grass. On the latter occasion, I slogged in quicksand-like mud a few hundred yards, while Mushu waited on a dirt mound, ready to be rescued but disinclined to make it easy on me.

On Super Bowl Sunday, we had a group at my house. When the game ended, Mushu's absence grew conspicuous. As people came in and out, did Mushu dash, undetected, into the street? Please...no.


We hustled up and down the stairs, opening every closet and cabinet, and inspecting the hidden underneaths of each bed. No cat. We canvassed the neighborhood until after midnight. No cat. I put food out front and checked through the night. No cat. Monday light, street-bystreet. No cat. Posters, social media posts, word-of-mouth requests for vigilance. No cat. It's Tuesday, late morning. There's a litter box out front of my house now. No calls. No cat.

I never quite understood the connection people have to their pets. That was before Mushu. He's a family member, as steadfast and loyal and important as any of the rest of us. I miss him like I would miss air.

The American Traditions Vocal Competition Gears Up For Its Best Year Yet

he week of February 18 is sure to be an incredible one. The American Traditions Vocal Competition (ATC) will return to Skidaway Island United Methodist Church (SIUMC), for its highly anticipated 26th anniversary season. With an outstanding lineup of 28 contestants, three new judges and one new pianist – as well as a new venue in downtown Savannah - the ATC is enthusiastically embracing a new era for this annual event.

New to the ATC board this season is Kellee Haselton, who moved to the Landings from Kalamazoo, Michigan in August of 2017, with her husband, Don, and their dog, Ella Fitzgerald. The Haseltons have four children - Jennifer, Justin, Sarah and Nat - and two beautiful granddaughters - Claire and Anna. Kellee recalls her son, Nat, telling her last year he was coming to Savannah for a vocal competition. His friend, Mikki Sodergren, artistic director of the ATC, had encouraged him to apply. He was one of the 28 quarterfinalists in the 2018 ATC, winning the People's Choice award and performing a song at the finals. The experience opened Kellee's eyes to the caliber of the contestants and the quality of this exciting competi-

tion. "As a professional musician for much of my life, I couldn't believe that the ATC had not been on my radar at all," she says. "I attended the quarterfinals to hear my son sing and was thoroughly impressed with the accomplished level of talent by – not only – the vocalists, but the pianists as well. I love the 'all-American music' element of the ATC and how it stretched the musicianship of the vocalists, as each has to sing in nine different genres. As a musician with a varied background and a vocal teacher, I completely embraced the surprising virtuosity and diversity of the finalists. What a wonderful way to celebrate vocalists who can sing all styles

Kellee grew up in a musical family, and is a classically trained pianist and vocalist. She taught general and vocal music for 30 years at all levels, most recently in the musical theatre department of Western Michigan University, and the Gagie School in Kalamazoo. Her first husband - father of Nat and Sarah, Steve Zegree – was a Steinway Artist and internationally known jazz pianist. Kellee has also had her own original choral compositions published.

"I have music directed dozens of shows for community, collegiate and professional Actors' Equity, and continue to teach voice and piano from my home," she says. "I volunteer my piano skills for the Jewish Women's Alliance of the Landings and Chatham County Public Schools. And, of course, I volunteer for the ATC and am thrilled to be on its board."

The ATC is lucky to have the Haselton family as enthusiastic supporters. Don works as CEO for the 600 Group, a London-based multinational, and is currently its director of mergers and acquisitions. This year, the family is housing Hannah Zazzaro, a New York-based vocalist and friend of Nat's. "We are so excited to get to know her and cheer her on," Kellee

of classic American music. The non-profit organization promotes these songs by producing an annual vocal competition in Savannah, awarding \$35,000 in cash prizes. Committed to serving the greater Savannah community, the ATC provides musical education, exposure and performances for Savannah locals of all ages. Singers are required to prepare three rounds of three different songs, all written by American composers, in order to span nine different genres of music - exposing singers to the history, roots, key players and stylistic nuances of each. The ATC recognizes these a wide variety of American music: opera, musical theatre, Hollywood, jazz, folk, country, pop/rock singer-songwriters (1980-today), art song, gospel, songs of Johnny Mercer, blues, religious music, popular music of 1950-1980, Great American Songbook, and

"The ATC operates at the highest level of musicality and it is all right here for our community," Kellee says. "I love that the ATC partners with the Savannah Voice Festival as well as the Savannah Philharmonic, and that the ATC is branching out in new areas. Our ATC on Tybee Concert series was a fun collaboration with the Tybee Post Theater."



Monday, February 18: The American Traditions Competition kicks off 7:30 p.m. with a Judge's Concert at Skidway Island United Methodist Church (SIUMC). Guests will enjoy an evening of music with performances by all three ATC judges. Tickets to this concert cost \$30 each.

Tuesday, February 19 and Wednesday, February 20: At 4 and 7:30 p.m., at the SIUMC, 28 quarterfinalists perform three diverse American songs. Half of the contestants will compete on Tuesday, and the remaining 14 will perform Wednesday. Day passes for the quarterfinals cost \$25.

Thursday, February 21: The 12 semifinalists will sing their next set of three songs at 4 and 7:30 p.m., at SIUMC. Semifinals passes are \$35.

Friday, February 22: New for 2018, the People's Choice award winner from each round will also perform in the finals, as well as the five shortlisted for the gold, silver and bronze medals, at 8 p.m. at the Trustees Theater, 216 E. Broughton Street. General seating tickets are \$40; premium seating is \$55.

Sodergren performed in Chatham County Public Schools. "Introducing young people to the unique musical opportunity provided by the ATC was extremely gratifying," she says.

Kellee is most excited for the first-ever ATC Student Vocal Competition. As part of ATC's mission to provide education for students in the arts, Sodergren and the board will bring back ATC singers to train students in different styles, culminating in a one-day competition. "Stay tuned for more details," she says.

Looking to the future, former ATC gold medalist and current artistic director, Mikki Sodergren, shares some new aspects of this year's competition and plans for more. "We have three new fabulous judges, including award-winning jazz musician, Melba Joyce; American composer, conductor and music administrator, Michael Ching, who is also the Composer in Residence for the Savannah VOICE Festival; and Tony Award-winning Broadway performer, Phillip Boykin."

Returning to the 2019 competition as emcee is Rebecca Odoriso, the talented 2015 ATC Silver Medalist, 2015 and 2016 Ben Tucker Jazz Award winner and the 2016 Johnny Mercer Award winner. Two crowd-pleasing pianists will also return: David Shenton will celebrate 10 years of piano collaboration with the competition, and Wilson Southerland will join the festivities for his sixth year. Accompanying contestants for his first time will be accomplished pianist, Andrew Sotomayor.

The accomplishments of some of the singers from each round - each selected from among applicants worldwide - conveys the caliber and diversity of this year's contestants.

Round One: Chloe Legrand is a soprano bluegrass musician from Sparta, Kentucky. At 14, she formed a bluegrass band called Kentucky Sassafras. In 2008, the band was chosen by the International Bluegrass Music Association to represent bluegrass music on a tour in Japan. Legrand formed another bluegrass band called Blue Belles, and is now a student of voice performance at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music.

Round Two: Cyrille-Aimée Daudel ventured from sneaking out to sing in gypsy encampments and on street corners in Europe, to dazzling audiences at the world's most prestigious jazz festivals and performing on Broadway. She then braved the notoriously tough audiences at New York's Apollo Theater, and was described a "rising star in the galaxy of jazz singers" by the New York Times.

Round Three: George Lovett is a recording artist and performer. He's been seen on Fox's "Showtime at the Apollo," and was among the top 10 in season 13 of "American Idol." Cur-

rently, he is finishing his MFA in performing arts at SCAD.

Round Four: Jacob Keith Watson is an actor/singer, Arkansas native and avid Notre Dame football fan. Some of his favorite credits include the Tony-nominated/winning revivals of "Carousel," "Hello, Dolly!" and "Violet." Watson has also been seen on Broadway in "Amélie," "The Phantom of the Opera," and the acclaimed Encores! revival of "1776," and the international tour of "Chicago."

A Week Pass to all performances – starting at \$154 – is the best value available to ticket buyers. With a Week Pass, any unused tickets can be donated daily for students to enjoy concerts. "I can promise that all who attend any part of the ATC will leave inspired, with their musical cup overflowing," Kellee Haselton says. "I believe that the arts stimulate creativity within a community and help it find common connection. Skidaway Island and the Landings are full of successful, polished, artful people and creative thinkers who will appreciate, applaud and enjoy the talented musicians of the ATC. The vocalists come from all over the world and leave the ATC experience savoring our Savannah and Southern hospitality."

SEALing the Deal

Author Jack Carr visits the Savannah Book Festival


mer-Pinkerton man, Dashiell Hammett, turned his experiences as a private investigator into fascinating tales that captured the imaginations of readers everywhere. Today, former-Navy SEAL, Jack Carr, follows the same tradition, bringing his military experience to the printed page.

Carr spent 20 years in Naval Special Warfare, from an enlisted SEAL sniper specializing in communications and intelligence, to leading special operations teams in Iraq,

Afghanistan and the Philippines. Last spring, he released his debut novel, *The Terminal List*, a fast-paced, action-packed thriller. Carr will be among the featured authors at this year's squadron." Savannah Book Festival.

Reece, one of two servicemen who survived a catastrophic ambush in Afghanistan. Returning home, the other survivor is found dead under mysterious circumstances, and soon after, Reece's wife and child are killed in a home invasion. Reece is convinced these events are no coincidence, and begins to unravel a conspiracy that stretches from his chain of command to higher levels in the federal government. With nothing to lose, the former Navy SEAL applies the lessons of warfare to his personal mission of vengeance.



resolve to join the SEAL teams and write thrillers, just like the authors I loved to read growing up," he explains.

Carr's early education in storytelling came through the works of Nelson DeMille, J.C. Pollock, Tom Clancy, Louis L'Amour, Marc Olden, A.J. Quinnell, and the aforementioned Morrell. Later, he found another important influence on his literary development. Says Carr, "I discovered the great Stephen Hunter, who continues to inspire me today."

While in the service, Carr followed writers like Daniel Silva, Vince Flynn and Brad Thor, all of whom are personal heroes. "I try to have my own voice," he says, "but I readily acknowledge the influence these masters of the craft have had on me and my writing."

The impact of those authors, coupled with his academic study of warfare and his experiences in combat, combine to make Carr's book a visceral read. "I took my feelings from combat and applied them to a fictional narrative," he says. "That was never part of a grand strategy, rather it was something that happened naturally as I wrote. It actually ended up being a very therapeutic process for me, which is not what I expected at the outset."

Initially, Carr just wanted to write a good story. As it progressed, it became a way for him to explore some of the emotions he had experienced "behind the scope." He believes one reason why it has resonated with readers is that, although a work of fiction, the emotions Reece feels in the novel are emotions Carr – and many others in the military – have experienced. "If the emotions associated with the characters in the novel feel authen-

tic," he says, "that's because they are.

This includes not only the psychological trauma of combat, but also the emotional shift that occurs upon returning home. "Exploring the emotions surrounding my military experience and transferring that experience into a fictional narrative became a journey that helped me as a human being and as an author."


He describes his book as a novel of revenge without constraint, but with multiple levels. Reece's campaign is also a war on a system removed from the consequences of its political decisions. "It's about frustration with strategic level leaders who send tactical level operators to their deaths from the comfort of their offices in Washington D.C. and Northern Virginia," he says.

As a serviceman, Carr was obliged to submit his manuscript to the Department of Defense for review, but that didn't influence the final narrative. "They advertised a 30-day review period and I got *The Terminal List* back in 45 days, which I thought was reasonable," he says.

Six or seven lines were redacted, but Carr chose to keep those lines blacked out in the novel so that he wouldn't have to resubmit. It also allowed readers the opportunity to try to figure out what was blacked out. "To be honest," he adds, "they blacked out a couple things you can find on official government websites."

The book has been extremely well received by critics and other political/military-thriller authors – as well as Carr's most demanding audience. He was uncertain how his former SEAL teammates would react. "I have been humbled and a bit relieved to have received nothing but positive feedback from those I fought beside in Iraq and Afghanistan," the author says. "Those that run to the sound of the guns are constant companions as I write, so their approval and support mean more than I can possibly express."

A sequel is scheduled for publication this summer. *True Believer* will be the second in what Carr sees as an ongoing series. "As long as readers want to hear about the next adventure and the evolution of James Reece, I'll be writing stories with him as the protagonist."





JOHN PARKER

He Served • By Ron Lauretti

ichmond Hill resident John Parker is a veteran firefighter, with 33 years of saving lives and property. He has also spent 25 (mostly) concurrent years serving his country in uniform.

On December 29, 1941, just a few weeks after America's entry into World War II, Parker was born in Drew, Mississippi, where his father was a sharecropper. Four years later, after the war had ended, factories north of the Mason-Dixon line were in need of workers to meet surging post-war demands. The Parker family was among the many poor Southerners to migrate north in hope of a better life. Parker's father landed a job with the Caterpillar Tractor Company in Peoria, Illinois. Though far from wealthy, the family enjoyed a better standard of living than their previous hardscrabble days in Mississippi.



When Parker graduated from high school in 1960, he hoped to go to college, but there was no way his family could afford to send him. Instead, he chose "Plan B," and enlisted. He entered the service at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot, San Diego, becoming a "Hollywood Marine" - the standard Jarhead joke for West Coast recruits. Parker was the platoon guidon bearer, standing in front of the unit alongside the commander, creating the rallying point for troops to fall into formation when so ordered. He was the platoon honor graduate, which earned him an automatic promotion to private first class.

Though trained as a radio telegraph operator, Parker served the duration of his enlistment as a crew member of the 2nd 8-Inch Howitzer Battery, 2nd Field Artillery Group, 2nd Marine Division, at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. These big guns could fire three standard high-explosive projectiles every two minutes up to a range of 25,000 meters. Parker was capable of fulfilling any one of the six crew positions. "It was extremely noisy with little hearing protection in those days but overall I enjoyed being a member of the gun crew," Parker says. "Especially if I was the one pulling the firing mechanism."

in any foreign conflict during Parker's fouryear enlistment, the only overseas deployment Parker made was a "Med" cruise, when combined units of the Navy's 6th Fleet performed defensive military maneuvers throughout the Mediterranean Sea. Parker traveled aboard a landing ship tank (LST), which transported the big howitzers "Living conditions were a little crowded on board, but as a young man I really enjoyed the rare opportunity to visit all the exotic ports of the Mediterranean,"



Parker says, preferring to remember the experience with the glass half-full.

As Parker approached the end of his fouryear hitch, he was highly recommended for reenlistment, but instead chose an honorable discharge, August 11, 1964, anxious to resume civilian life back home in Peoria. He found work at the Caterpillar Tractor Company, but soon tired of the dull routine of factory work. Fortunately, an exciting opportunity developed a year later when the Peoria Fire Department expanded with openings for 25 firemen. Parker applied, beginning a challenging but rewarding career. "I loved it from Day One," he says enthusiastically.

Parker remembers that when he began as a fireman in 1965, many fire departments nationwide excluded African-Americans and females from their ranks. As a result of the building Civil Rights movement, opportunities for diverse candidates began to open up nationwide, especially in larger cities. "But," Parker emphatically explains, "I personally earned every bit of my promotions because I had a good attitude, did my job well and faithfully, and passed all the advancement

Parker remained with the Peoria Fire Department for 23 years, including a four-year assignment as an arson investigator. He rose steadily through the ranks, and in 1988 was promoted to chief of the department, in charge of 160 firemen.

During his years in Peoria, Parker was busy outside of the fire station. In 1972, he enrolled in Peoria Central College part-time, carefully scheduling classes so as not to con-

flict with his firefighting schedule. In 1976, he earned an associate degree in arts and sciences, and another in 1979 in applied science. He later taught as an adjunct professor at Illinois Central College, teaching fire science technology. Aside from classroom work, he also served in the Illinois Air National Guard from 1976 to 1990, rising to the rank of master sergeant.

Parker's days in Peoria came to an end when Los Angeles County annexed the city of Pomona, California. When a headhunting firm conducting a national search for Pomona's next fire chief found Parker, he and his wife, Eve, were off to sunny Southern California. The Pomona job, as compare to Peoria, was a big one. As a battalion chief for the Los Angeles County Fire Department, Parker had 5,000 firefighters and paramedics in his charge, operating out of 17 firehouses. He was responsible for several airplanes, helicopters and heavy equipment.

Firefighting is a risky profession, and Parker has had several close calls throughout the years. Once, a roof he was walking on caved in, dropping him into an attic that had just begun to burn. Another time, he was on the top step of a fire ladder leaning against a house engulfed in flames. The window in front of him blew outward with enough force to cause the axe he was holding to severely cut his arm. It was all he could do to keep from dropping the axe on the men on the ground below. Two months of medical leave were required for his arm to recover.

"I don't want to sound like a hero," Parker says, "but another time I was able to crawl through a burning room and rescue a scared and almost burned toddler trapped between a bed and a wall. I'll never forget the screams of the panicky mother, or her relief when we gave the rescued child back to her."

While in California, Parker served seven years in the Air Force Reserve, once more with the rank of master sergeant. That gave the military veteran a total of 25 years of service, 21 as an active reservist and a fulltime firefighter. Time-management and patriotic commitment are obviously part of his DNA.


In 1999, Parker retired, choosing to relocate to the Savannah area, primarily because he was familiar with Hunter Army Airfield. He and his wife wanted to live in a military-friendly area along the Southeast

coast. Since their arrival, Parker has been very active in civic and military affairs. He has served as president of the 100 Black Men organization and as president of the historic American Legion Post 500. Post 500 needs major renovations, and Parker has been the chief fundraiser for the past 10 years. Parker has been Georgia's 1st District delegate to the Legion's national convention for four years. For his involvement in American Legion activities, Parker was named grand marshal of Savannah's 2018 Veteran's Day parade, a well-deserved honor.

The former firefighter recently stepped down as an officer of the Chatham County Veterans Association, but remains an active member of the Forty and Eight, an organization originally formed by veterans of World War I who were also members of the American Legion. Membership is by invitation only. The name refers to boxcars in France used to transport either 40 men or eight horses to the front lines. Its main purpose is to support several charitable causes, including scholarships to nursing students. For the past eight years, Parker has been instrumental in raising money for scholarships to Chatham County recipients, which has been another iteration in a lifetime of service.

EGYPTIAM ODYSSEY (PART 2)

After three days enjoying a Nile River cruise aboard the *Farah*, we arrived in Luxor. The city is built upon the site of the ancient city of Thebes, which became the capital of Egypt around 1700 BC. Luxor stretches to both sides of the Nile, including the richest and most famous necropolis in the world.

DAY 8: THE VALLEY OF THE KINGS

Deir El Bahari, one of the most splendid temples in Luxor, lies to the west of the Nile, at the base of a small mountain. It was built around 1500 BC, by Queen Hatshepsut, whom Egyptologists regard to be one of the most successful female pharaohs. She ascended the throne of Egypt in 1478 BC, ruling for 20 years as regent on behalf of Thutmose III, her husband's infant son by a secondary wife. On the other side of the mountain, further west, lies the Valley of the Kings, the principal burial place of the major royal figures, including Ramesses III.

Egyptian royalty had abandoned pyramids in favor of underground tombs. After the mummified bodies of the pharaohs were laid to rest, the passages were sealed and covered with rock and rubble. With the entrances totally obscured, the pharaohs were confident that their tombs, unlike those of their ancestors, would be safe from thievery. They were mistaken. Almost all of the tombs were pilfered over the centuries, but they still give visitors an idea of the opulence and power of the pharaohs.


The tombs are decorated with scenes from Egyptian mythology, and offer clues as to the beliefs and funerary rituals of the period. Exploration, excavation and conservation continue

in the valley, with the discovery of two additional tomb entrances as recently as 2008. To date, the valley is known to contain 63 tombs, ranging in size from a simple pit to a complex tomb with more than 120 chambers. It is best known as the location of the tomb of Tutankhamun (c. 1332–1323 BC).

Theories strongly suggest that Tutankhamun is the son of Akhenaten (also known as Amenhotep IV), who is noted for abandoning the traditional practice of worshipping multiple gods in favor of a single god, Ra. However, these religious shifts were not widely accepted, and after his death, traditional practices were gradually restored. Akhenaten was discredited, his monuments dismantled and hidden. He and his immediate successors – including Tutankhamun – were excluded from the official dynastic lists. Tutankhamun was not a particularly noteworthy ruler due to his young age and short reign. Evidence suggests his tomb was robbed soon after his death. When many of the tombs from the Valley of the Kings were dismantled (c. 1100 BC), it is believed his was overlooked due to his family's fall from grace.

As a result of this oversight, his tomb was nearly intact when it was discovered by Howard Carter in 1922. More than 5,000 items were found in the tomb, which took 10 years to catalog. Many of the treasures are on display in the Egyptian Museum of Antiquities in Cairo, including Tut's ceremonial gold burial mask. It is perhaps the most impressive piece in the collection, comprised of 25 pounds of solid gold, inlaid lapis lazuli, carnelian, obsidian, colored glass, quartz and turquoise.

The museum, constructed around 1902, contains many important



pieces of ancient Egyptian history, including the famed Rosetta stone, a stone tablet measuring approximately 52 inches long and 30 inches wide. On it is carved the same writing in three scripts – Hieroglyphic, Demotic Egyptian and Greek. Because Greek was well known among scholars, the stone became the key to deciphering the Hieroglyphics. During the Egyptian Revolution of 2011, the museum was broken into, and several artifacts – including two mummies – were damaged.



The Temple of Karnak features the largest hypostyle hall in the world consisting of 134 columns representing the papyrus flower. The hall was built by King Seti I (1313-1292 BC) and was completed by his son Ramesses II (1292-1225 BC).

Around 50 objects were lost, but since then about half have been recovered. A new state-of-the-art museum is currently under construction in Cairo. At a cost of \$790 million, the Grand Egyptian Museum will occupy 5.2 million square feet, and is slated to open in 2020.

DAY 9

On the west bank of the Nile is one of the most visited historical sites in Egypt, the Temple of Karnak. Construction of the temple complex began c. 1500 BC, and continued for several centuries. Approximately 30 pharaohs contributed to the buildings, enabling it to reach a size, complexity and diversity unlike any other in the world. One famous feature of Karnak is the hypostyle hall – 50,000 square feet, with 134 massive columns arranged in 16 rows. There are also a few smaller temples and sanctuaries that connect to the nearby Luxor Temple, a large complex constructed approximately 1360 BC. The earliest structures were erected by Amenhotep III, and he and Rameses II were responsible for most of the temple's huge colonnades and courts. Luxor Temple suffered some damage in the reign of Amenhotep's son, Akhenaten, when the name and figure of Amon were erased, but it was reconstructed in the reigns of Tutankhamun and Horemhab (1306 -1292 BC).

While in Luxor, we stayed at the Hilton Luxor Resort and Spa, a luxurious hotel that offers every amenity one might expect. Its pool deck overlooks the Nile, where we enjoyed a comfortable climate averaging about 80 degrees. The adjacent dining area features a broad menu of both Middle Eastern and European/American selections.

DAYS 10 AND 11

For our final two days in Luxor, we were joined by Amr Elsharkwy, an Egyptologist who shared much of his professional insight into the culture of the ancient Egyptians. Many of the sites we visited were less frequented by tourists, and free from heavy crowds. Thanks to Amr, we had a virtual private tour among the tombs and temples of Upper

For several thousand years, Abydos flourished as a cemetery for the people of Egypt. The most famous building at Abydos today is the Temple of Seti I. This temple was begun by Seti I and completed by his son, Rameses II. It is elegantly decorated and uniquely well-preserved, one of the masterpieces of Egyptian art and architecture. The temple features the Table of Abydos, listing many dynastic pharaohs of Egypt. Though some names were deliberately omitted (such as Akhenaten and Tutankhamun), it has been compared to the Rosetta Stone for its archaeological significance. Within the temple are seven chapels built for the worship of the pharaoh and principal deities, being the "state" deities Ptah, Re-Horakhty, and (centrally positioned) Amun-Re; the remaining three chapels are dedicated to the Abydos triad of Osiris, Isis and Horus.

The Dendera Temple complex is one of the best-preserved temple complexes in Egypt. The main building is Hathor temple, and on the rear of the temple exterior is a carving of the well-known Cleopatra and her son by Julius Caesar, Ptolemy XV.

The next day, we returned to the east bank of the Nile to visit the Valley of the Queens. Amr and Osama took us to the Tomb of Nefer-

tari, Ramesses II's favorite wife. It is considered the best preserved of any Egyptian burial site. The astonishing reds, blues, greens and golds remain as vibrant as if they were painted yesterday.

Adjacent to the Valley of the Queens is Deir el-Medina, an ancient Egyptian village that was home to the artisans who worked on the tombs in the Valley of the Kings, c. 1550-1080 BC. The village may have been built apart from the greater population due to the secretive nature of the work carried out in the tombs. The site spans almost 400 years of ancient Egyptian culture, providing one of the most thoroughly documented accounts of community life in the ancient world. There is no comparable site in which the organization, social interactions, working and living conditions of a community can be studied in such detail.

That evening, just prior to our final full day in Egypt, we visited the Luxor bazaar for shopping. Souvenirs of all types can be found, from t-shirts to jewelry to miniature replicas of Egyptian monuments, and the prices are fair, depending how much one is willing to bargain. The vendors expect their customers to haggle, until both are satisfied with the price.

In all, our tour of Egypt was the trip of a lifetime. The Egyptian people appreciate American visitors to their country. Osama and his team at JourneytoEgypt.com/en provided every accommodation we could ever need and their attention was invaluable in making this an unforgettable journey.


