It's St. Patrick's Day. I'm downtown. It's quiet...very quiet, indeed.

I'm writing this from my home office inside my carriage house. Moments ago, after careful consideration, I typed "showtunes" into my Spotify search box. When the system responded with a page of icons, I clicked on "The London Theater Orchestra and Singers: The Greatest Showtunes Ever." I promise, this is not normal for me, but these are strange times, and extraordinary measures are required.


I don't need my usual playlist of angst-y tunes today. But "You'll Never Walk Alone" feels right. So does the wide-eyed optimism of "Oh, What a Beautiful Mornin'." And "People (Who Need People)," the loners among us are reminded of a source of untapped strength.

It's difficult to avoid seeming tone deaf when speaking or writing publicly during a panic-inducing crisis. So, I'll simply share honestly: I am both scared and not. It oscillates, seemingly minute to minute. Last night, half-awake, half-asleep for most of it, in my semi-conscious moments I tried to evaluate my breathing, dreading it had grown labored since I first closed my eyes. I wasn't lucid enough to determine if the feeling was psychosomatically induced or real. Counting the seconds as I held my breath, my lung capacity seemed to shrink. Groggily, desperately, I willed myself to return to slumber each time I awoke. If the virus was overcoming me, I'd deal with it after sunrise. If not, I'd arise and celebrate the reprieve.

I moved to Savannah in August of 2001. Three weeks after arriving, I made my first trip back to New York City on September 10, and my family stayed here to tend to school and our unremarkable lives. The next day, the world was in chaos, and I was unmoored from my new footings, wandering the burning city's streets with my friend, Larry, my mouth agape and tears in my eyes.

Gradually, we (all of us) stemmed the crying. It didn't happen immediately – I have precise memories of myself using workout equipment at the Oakridge Fitness Center, watching TV, listening through headphones, suddenly giving way to unstoppable waves of despair. Then, one day, I can't pinpoint when, I didn't weep.

This is like that, in a way. Back then, an unexpected enemy seized our shared sense of security. We craved leadership, stability, revenge.



Yet, we have subtle things to celebrate, if we are willing to recognize them. We have opportunities to deeply connect in ways that everyday hustle prevents. There is simple joy in preparing and sharing a family meal. And we get to stop being angry at one another for a while. Have you noticed that the yelling has quieted? When we all face a common foe, we highlight our innate common sensibilities and ignore our manufactured or self-amplified differences, if only for an instant in the span of generational time. Cherish that this is such a moment, that the human spirit is a powerful and beautiful collective force.

People will die, sadly, as they do and have done every day since man began walking the earth. And people will continue to live, shelving their darkest fears and deepest regrets in order to serve others and themselves. There will be bad days and better days and, eventually... just...days, one as unremarkable as the next.





Tor the monarch butterfly, the struggle for survival is getting Harder. Researchers estimate the population of monarch butterflies has dropped 90 percent in the last 20 years. By the end of 2020, the "King of the Butterflies" may be added to the threatened or endangered species list.

Extensive studies show the primary cause of the declining numbers is habitat loss. Milkweed is the monarch caterpillar's main food source, but herbicides and development have wiped out much of the milkweed along the butterfly's migratory paths.

As a large and visually striking butterfly, monarchs have been treasured far and wide. Monarchs were reared on the international space station, and are the state butterfly of Illinois, Minnesota, Texas, Vermont, West Virginia, Alabama and Idaho. They are not to be confused with the gulf fritillary butterfly, which is similar in color and size, but the patterns are different, especially on the underside of the wings. In addition, the giant gulf has a strong preference for lantana, not

For those who don't remember their grade school science lessons, monarchs are both amazing and mysterious. In spring, tiny cream-colored eggs are laid on the milkweed and, five days later, a caterpillar emerges and eats voraciously.

Milkweed fuels the monarch caterpillar, but the plant is toxic to birds. By eating it, the yellow-and-black caterpillar becomes toxic, and predators learn to avoid eating the appropriately hazard-tape striped



After about two weeks of feeding, the caterpillar forms a blue-green chrysalis, and approximately 12 days later a new monarch emerges. The whole metamorphosis, from egg to butterfly, takes about a month. The butterflies live about 20 days, and each successive generation repeats the same transformative process as it migrates from Mexico to Canada.

Monarchs are the only insects that migrate thousands of miles like birds, in a kind of a relay race for survival. Along the journey, they feed on nectar from a variety of flowers, including milkweed, asters, lilies, verbenas, clover and butterfly bush. With this sweet fuel, they travel an average of 25 to 30 miles a day. It takes about four generations of monarchs to reach Canada, each one traveling a little further north than the last.

How they know when and where to migrate remains a bit of a mystery. Sunlight and temperature are considered contributing factors. Additionally, researchers have found that without their large antennae, they are unable to navigate.

about seven months, flying about 2,500 miles south to Mexico for the winter, where they cluster in massive numbers in a colony of rare oyamel fir trees. Years ago, when there were millions more coloring the trees bright orange, it was said that their fluttering wings sounded like gently flowing water.

Because they overwinter in the same place each year, monarch numbers and trends can be determined. Among the organizations providing much of this data are the World Wildlife Fund, the Monarch Larva Monitoring Project, the Cape May Migration Monitoring Project, the North America Butterfly Association and numerous state agencies, including the University of Georgia.

Georgia is well positioned to help bring monarchs back to abundance. The butterflies migrate through the state, and it is during this critical spring migration that the butter-

## Live smart

## What You Need to Know About COVID-19

St. Joseph's/Candler is prepared for and actively monitoring the spread of the coronavirus

t. Joseph's/Candler infectious disease Joseph's/Candler has implemented several doctors and nurses are in close contact with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the Georgia Department of Public Health (GDPH), and our local health department in monitoring the development of CoVID-19 in our area.

#### WHAT IS COVID-19?

COVID-19 is a respiratory illness that can spread from person to person. It's officially named SARS-CoV-2, and the disease it causes has been named coronavirus disease 2019 or COVID-19 for short.

#### WHAT IS ST. JOSEPH'S/CANDLER DOING TO PREPARE FOR COVID-19?

St. Joseph's/Candler is following the CDC's recommended infection prevention and control practices including

- Minimizing the chance for exposure
- Placing any patient with suspected or known COVID-19 in a separate location
- Providing personal protective equipment (PPE), such as gloves, masks and gowns, to our co-workers
- Educating staff, patients and the community on proper hand hygiene

We are screening patients for COVID-19 by asking about recent travel history, exposure to others who have traveled, and determining if the person is experiencing typical symptoms of the virus. Because many of our patients are vulnerable to COVID-19, St.

visitation restrictions to avoid the spread of respiratory illness.

Currently, we have visitor restrictions in place that prohibit those with flu-like or other respiratory symptoms from visiting our facilities. For the safety of our patients and for the safety of your children, children under the age of 18 are not permitted to visit any patients at St. Joseph's/Candler. Additionally, only one visitor at a time will be allowed to accompany a patient. Patients and visitors to the LCRP will be screened through a written questionnaire asking about your travel history and possible contact with an ill traveler, or if you are experiencing any respiratory symptoms (cough, shortness of breath) or a fever.

At St. Joseph's/Candler, our co-workers are prepared year-round to handle infectious diseases and an influx of patients, should that occur. At both St. Joseph's and Candler Hospitals, we stock PPE – head covers, masks, eye protection, gowns, gloves, coveralls and disposable boots – specifically designed to treat patients suspected of having an infectious virus. The emergency room staff is trained regularly on guidelines for putting on and taking

There are 20 negative pressure rooms between the two hospitals that are always prepared for use. These rooms are intended for patient isolation. When the door opens to such a room, air goes in and does not escape.



#### **HOW WILL ST. JOSEPH'S/CANDLER TEST AND TREAT A POTENTIAL COVID-19** PATIENT?

St. Joseph's/Candler is in close contact with the CDC as well as the GDPH. The hospital system is following the most current guidelines from those agencies. If a patient comes through one of the emergency departments with respiratory symptoms, he or she will be masked by an intake nurse. The patient will be asked about travel history, exposure to others who have traveled recently, and symptoms will be assessed. Examining personnel rule out other potential causes for symptoms first, like the flu.

If a patient is symptomatic enough for hospitalization, then he or she will be a candidate for testing. After consultation with public health officials, testing will proceed, if indicated. The results can take three to four days to return. During this time, the patient is in isolation and treatment for symptoms is provided. Family members and those who have been in contact with the patient are asked to self-quarantine at home pending the results of the test.

Patients who come to the health system's primary care offices who meet the criteria individual basis. If symptoms are mild, the patient will be advised to self-quarantine. If

the symptoms progress, then they may be a candidate for testing. This will be determined will be evaluated by their physician on an by the physician's judgment in consultation with our infectious diseases team.

#### **How Does COVID-19 Spread?**

COVID-19 is a new disease and experts be asymptomatic but still spread the virus. are still learning how it spreads. However, It may also be possible that someone gets experts believe it mainly spreads from person-to-person by:

- People who are in close proximity with one another (about six feet).
- Through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs or sneezes; These droplets may land on people who are nearby, or possibly inhaled into the lungs.

People are thought to be most contagious when they are the sickest. There also are indications the virus can spread before someone shows any symptoms, and some people may

COVID-19 by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it and then touching the face. This is not thought to be the main way the virus spreads.

While experts are still learning about COVID-19, it appears this virus spreads easily and sustainably in affected communities, according to the CDC. Community spread means people have been infected with the virus in an area, including some who are not sure how or where they became infected.

#### What Are the Symptoms of COVID-19?

Symptoms of COVID-19 have ranged from mild to severe illness and death for confirmed cases. The following symptoms may appear two to 14 days after exposure

- Cough (lower respiratory illness)
- Shortness of breath

Call your doctor if you develop these symptoms, have been in close contact with a person known to have COVID-19, or have recently traveled to an area with widespread or ongoing spread of COVID-19 including

- China
- Iran
- Italy
- Japan
- South Korea

If you experience any of the symptoms associated with COVID-19, your healthcare provider can recommend you stay home, or go to the emergency room. If you are experiencing severe symptoms, such as difficulty breathing, call 911 immediately.

#### Who's most at risk of getting COVID-19?

According to the CDC, most people in the U.S. currently have little immediate risk of exposure to the virus. At this time, the virus is NOT spreading widely in the U.S.

Some people are at higher risk of getting very sick from this virus, including

- Older adults
- The very young
- People with serious chronic medical condtions, such as heart disease, diabetes or lung disease
- People with compromised or weakened immune systems

#### **How Can You Prevent** Gettina COVID-19?

For the general population, your risk of getting COVID-19 is low. The best way to prevent infection is to avoid exposure to the virus. There are simple, everyday preventative steps you can take to help prevent the spread of any respiratory virus:

- Avoid close contact with people who are
- If you are sick, stay
- Wash your hands frequently with soap

and water for at least 20 seconds. Use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer when







he term "grand slam" has been around since the early 19th century, when Edmond Hoyle was formalizing the game of bridge. Eventually, it was applied by sportswriters to baseball, golf and tennis, and was always associated with the number four. The feats of Bobby Jones in 1930 and Don Budge in 1938 were dubbed "grand slams" by the media because of their domination in their respective major championships. Golf and tennis are unique in the world of sports in that they stage major events during each calendar year, rather than playoffs culminating in a final championship game. A golfer or tennis player's place in history is defined, in large measure, by the number of majors won in a career.

In 1860, there was just one major in golf, the British Open, more formally known as "The Open Championship." The event featured only eight players – no cause for hoopla and international headlines. It



took 25 years for the group of contestants to grow to 60 players. Not until the 1890s and the arrival of the "Great Triumvirate" of Vardon, Taylor and Braid, did the Open truly became a major. After Bobby Jones' retirement in 1930 and a hia-

tus during the war years, the Open began to lose its prestige, at least on the west side of the pond. Then, in the Championship's centenary year, Arnold Palmer journeyed to St. Andrews and nearly won. He won back-to-back in 1961 and '62, and the Open was reborn.

In 1885, a second major, the British Amateur, was established. It was followed 10 years later by the U.S. Open and U.S. Amateur. The 1895 U.S. Open was played on a nine-hole course, over 36 holes, in one day, with a field of 11. The cachet of a major was certainly absent, yet Horace Rawlins will forever be known as a major winner.

In 1899, the Western Golf Association founded its open championship; and, for three decades, it was accorded major status by players and sportswriters. Walter Hagen won five

times between 1916 and 1932, yet his victories are not included as majors in his record. After World War II, the Masters supplanted the Western as a major. After all, we can't have more than four, now can we? The Western's prestige persisted into the eras of Snead, Hogan, Palmer, Casper, Nicklaus and Watson, as each won multiple times. Now, the event is no more, a victim of the FedEx Cup playoffs.

National championships have always had an innate aura of significance, although the Canadian and Australian Opens, both initiated in 1904, have never risen to the highest level of prestige. Bobby Jones, at 17, played in the 1919 Canadian Open and finished second, 16 strokes behind the winner. In 1971, the Canadian inadvertently became part of golf's "Triple Crown," thanks to Lee Trevino. That year he won the British Open, the U.S. Open, and the Canadian Open, thus holding three national championships, and the Tour's three oldest events, simultaneously. Tiger Woods repeated the feat in 2000.


The Australian Open may not be a major, but the list of hall-of-fame winners is long, and goes back to 1936, when Gene Sarazen won. Gary Player won seven times between 1958 and 1974. Jack Nicklaus won six times between 1964 and 1978. Greg Norman won five times between 1980 and 1996. Peter Thompson won three times between 1951 and 1972. Arnold Palmer and Tom Watson each won once. The purse was paltry by American standards; the 2018 winner won the equivalent of \$150,000. The fields were never strong enough to qualify for major status, and the entry of many big name players had much to do with appearance money and the off-season on the American tour. Clearly, Nicklaus didn't show up for the chance to win a pittance, but was paid handsomely if he deigned to do so.

In 1916, the golf landscape changed when American professionals created their own organization and tournament schedule. The first PGA Championship was held that year, exclusive for professional golfers. The match-play format made it unique among the four majors, but was not ideally suited to the age of television. In 1958, the format was abandoned for stroke play so viewers would be guaranteed to see stars on Sunday. The PGA lost some of its stature at that point and has

since been considered the least prestigious major.

The Masters, first played in 1934, was a quaint affair for 60 assorted professionals. The winner was awarded \$1,500, and only the top 10 finishers received any prize money. In 1935, Sarazen's final round double-eagle on the 15th hole helped create the Masters' mystique, but was witnessed by a only a sparse crowd. The Masters wouldn't attain major status until after World War II.

The British PGA Championship commenced in 1955, but Arnold Palmer's victory in 1975 did not do for that event what his victories in 1961 and '62 did for the Open Championship. Perhaps, by 2055, after Brexit is sorted.

In the 160 years since the first Open Championship, the major status of golf tournaments has waxed and waned. Before 1916, the majors were the two Opens and the two Amateurs. If you were a professional, your opportunities for glory were half those of an amateur. Bobby Jones' hall-of-fame career is based on his fabulous record in those events. Today, amateur championships are merely springboards to the big show. A nice trophy for the den and a bargaining chip to bolster endorsement deals as a professional.

Major status is a combination of history, tradition, purse, coverage and the importance placed upon it by players, fans and media. If everyone agrees it's something special, then it's something special. Sociologists call this "collective obsessive behavior," sometimes known as mass hysteria.

Now, the PGA Tour wants to have it both ways - majors and play-



offs. It doesn't control three of the four majors, and that rankles. In 1974, the Tour created the Players Championship, which seemed to undermine the value of the PGA Championship. Jack Nicklaus won the inaugural event, a boon to the debut. Today, the Players is an enormous event with a stellar field, and there is much conversation about its major status. But that would make five...Oh no! Not satisfied with that success, the PGA Tour instituted a playoff system for the Tour Championship and the FedEx Cup in 2007. After a dozen years, they finally got the format right, leading to an exciting finish. The Players Championship and the Tour Championship are now firmly entrenched as big-time events, and they desperately want to join the major club.


But why wait for history, tradition and the collective consciousness to decide what will be deemed a major? Simply do what the LPGA did and designate majors by edict. One day, it declared the Dinah Shore and the du Maurier Classic were majors, adding them with the U.S. Women's Open and the LPGA Championship, to get to the magic number of four. In hindsight, associating majors with a daytime talk show host and a cigarette manufacturer might not have been the wisest moves to ensure the elite status of the two tourneys. In 2001, du Maurier withdrew its sponsorship, so the LPGA said, "Okay, Women's British Open, you are now a major! You've earned it." Then, in 2013, the LPGA did the unthinkable: It created a fifth major! Evian Championship, welcome to the club, even if you are held in France and the French have as much disdain for golf as they do for, well, just about everything not French. The LPGA's rationale seems to be that because the majors – designated or traditional – are qualifications for its Hall of Fame, the players will want to win them more than any other tournament, and that is the very definition of a major, after all.

The calendar year contains a natural limit to the total number of possible majors. It shouldn't be more than one per month, although the LPGA has chosen to schedule majors back-to-back. Players need time off, and fans need time to anticipate the big events. When the PGA Tour chose to end its season in August with the Tour Championship, it relegated all majors to January through July. The Players is clearly a major, and that leaves future fans with two more events to add to the total. If the Memorial and the Arnold Palmer want consideration, they will have to adjust their schedule to comply with the one-a-month guideline.

Of course, all hopes for fame-in-perpetuity are doomed to fail from the outset. Assuming that life on this planet survives the Corona virus, will golf even exist in 500 years? Linksland will have become seabed and we'll bid a fond farewell to the fairways of St. Andrews and Pebble Beach. In the year 2950, will anyone care about Super Bowl LIII when they play Super Bowl MMCMLXXXIV?

In a mere 250 million years, Earth's meandering continents will have combined into one supercontinent, Pangaea Proxima. At that point borders will be meaningless, and a true world golf tour will be inevitable. Our unified descendants should enjoy the good times while they last. In one billion years, our sun will be 10 percent brighter, and the accompanying increase in heat energy will set off a runaway greenhouse effect on Earth, like that which turned the Venus into a vicious hellscape. It's hard enough to play golf in the rain, much less acid rain, temperatures of 870°F, and atmospheric pressures of 1,350 pounds per square inch. Fore!7



GEORGE K. GANNAM AMERICAN LEGION POST 184
THUNDERBOLT, GEORGIA

here are many military veteran organizations in the Savannah area, but perhaps none more active than the George K. Gannam American Legion Post 184 in Thunderbolt. The American Legion is the largest veteran's organization in the U.S., enabling veterans to continue serving their country and communities.

The current commander of Post 184 is Tony Atkins, and Mary Hohnerlein serves as auxiliary president. Post 184 is named in honor of the first Savannah casualty of World War II. Gannam graduated from Benedictine Military School in 1938, enlisting in the Army Air Corps the following year. The 22-year-old staff sergeant

was a radio operator at Pearl Harbor when the Japanese launched their surprise attack the morning of December 7, 1941. According to official reports, Gannam was killed attempting to prevent the destruction of American aircraft at the adjacent Hickam Airfield. He was posthumously awarded, among other citations, a Purple Heart and the Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal. In a tragic twist of fate, just prior to his death he fulfilled his aspiration of becoming a flight cadet.

With the help of Savannah's two World War I Legion posts – Posts 135 and 36 – the official charter of Post 184 was received in January of 1946. Its first location was a rented home above a restaurant at Whitaker and Congress Streets. As some of the original founding members reportedly said, a table for a bar and empty barrels for seats definitely trumped their wartime battle stations – muddy foxholes dug into the ground, the numbingly cold gun turrets of a B-17 bomber,

the cramped quarters of a submarine, or the hot and muggy interior of a Sherman

It did not take long for Post 184 to make its mark in the community. The group held the first ceremony in the U.S. that honored the people killed at Pearl Harbor. The ceremony garnered national attention for the local post. Another early achievement was a blood bank, as Post 184 stepped forward to secure 20,000 signatures from prospective blood donors. The post won the National American Legion Community Service Award for the establishment of a psychiatric ward at St. Joseph's Hospital, the first in the nation.

The initiative became so successful that replicating it in other communities became a nationwide project for the American Legion. Similar wards were created throughout the country, providing treatment for mentally disturbed patients, especially battle-weary veterans suffering from what is now recognized as post-traumatic stress disorder.

Continuing their efforts in healthcare, the determined members of Post 184 were instrumental in raising funds for a much-needed community hospital in Savannah. The hospital, which opened in 1955, was dedicated to the memory of all military veterans, and appropriately named Memorial Hospital. Today, the expanded Memorial Health University Medical Center contains a Level I trauma center and is a major teaching hospital, hosting a Mercer University School of Medicine campus.

Throughout its history, Post 184 has earned many awards and commendations for its leadership in various community projects. The group has worked in the areas of child welfare, national security, service to disabled veterans, academic awards, high school oratorical contests, the Boy Scouts, and many Red Cross programs.

The post is annually involved in Savannah's St. Patrick's Day parade. Its members proudly walk or ride, anchored by a remaining contingent of waving World War II veterans, the old soldiers who bravely rushed to the sound of enemy guns.

Eventually, the post established its permanent home in Thunderbolt. The building was constructed for the post at 3003 Rowland Avenue, and dedicated on June 16, 1972. The speaker at the dedication ceremony was Brig. Gen. Eugene Lynch, commanding general of the U.S. Army Flight Training Center at Hunter Army Airfield and Fort Stewart. The building features two banquet rooms, a kitchen, a bar, offices, and a comfortable lobby. The clubhouse has been in continual use for many activities. In addition to conventional events such as Bingo (every Wednesday and Saturday nights and open to the public), Post 184 holds oyster roasts, dances and special dinners on a monthly basis. There are "turkey shoots" at the backyard shooting range.

Charlies' Canteen, the club bar, opens each day at 3 p.m. It is named for Charlie Hearn (*The Skinnie, Vol. 7, #2, January 23, 2009*), a Savannahian who fought in the Battle of the Bulge. For 45 days of combat in bitter cold weather, he and other paratroopers of the 101st Airborne held off numerically superior German Army forces surrounding Bastogne, France.

On the first Monday evening of each month, the post hosts a special event, near and dear to the many veterans' organizations in the area. Preceding the regular business meeting, one of the 26 local organizations comprising the Veterans Council of Chatham County serves a meal. Attendees are not required to be Legionnaires, but they do have to belong to one of the veterans groups. A strong camaraderie among this mix of proud veterans is evident throughout the banquet room.

During monthly meetings, current and future events relative to veterans are discussed, such as the selection of the annual Veteran of the Year and periodic updates on veteran's benefits and projects. The presiding chairman is elected annually. Doug Andrews, a former U.S. Army combat officer and local attorney, held that position for the past seven years. Andrews has been one of the driving forces behind the Chatham County World War II memorial – a large sculpted globe prominently displayed on River Street, featuring the name of every Chatham County veteran who served in World War II.

With the influx of the many returning veterans, Post 184's membership peaked at close to 1,000 members in the years immediately following World War II. Through good fiscal stewardship, it remains financially sound. Membership today is approximately 300 dedicated veterans, mostly from the Vietnam Era. The ladies' auxiliary is very active and an important arm of the post. Between the Legionnaires and auxiliary, Savannah's venerable George K. Gannam American Legion Post 184 is in good hands.







Alton woke up for his usual routine on the hobby farm, but he didn't feel right. It started with bad sweats and soon he couldn't feel his left side.

After some tests, it was determined he had a stroke. Alton was out of the acute therapy window and there was no evidence that there was a clot that could be treated. So, Dr. Stewart determined the best treatment was prevention and identifying future risk factors along with optimizing his medication.
