

## tpfront

I'm writing a cookbook, which is really an extended love letter to my kids.

I'm not a chef. But I'm a good cook. I'm not a renowned writer. But I'm published and some people like my stuff.

Food approaches divinity in my world. Thinking about it, shopping for it, making it, eating it – these are the sacraments of my culinary religion. And the written word is the only reliable tool in my kit that connects the things that fill my head, my heart and my soul, three siblings who often seem to have never met. My compositions convey the messages that are too genuine for my mouth.

I can be distant, detached, aloof. It looks like arrogance; in fact, it's fear. At my essence, I'm shy, self-conscious, full of doubt. At the keyboard, the chains of insecurity loosen, if only for long enough to craft a paragraph or two. At the stove, I silently profess my love. My food is an affirmational ode, sung without sound. Food is my constant and faithful companion. And writing gives me hope for an honest voice.

My recipes and my essays are memorials, vessels for preserving the basic good inside me. Together, they are the closest thing to a legacy with and of which I am both comfortable and proud. Kitchen creations are, besides prescriptions for pleasure, metaphors. I speak through food. Learning about food parallels my ongoing journey towards self-discovery.

There might not be a more recognized representation of the Italian-American experience than marinara sauce. Yet, it is a very personal thing - your idea of marinara. The name suggests the sea, specifically "seafaring," linguistically. No matter your familial bias, you'll find a common component in every version of this sauce: tomatoes. Marinara's origin story features Naples, the hardscrabble Calabrian seaport that spit so many of its desperate and/or aspirational native sons and daughters towards American shores during the great migration of the late-19th and early-20th centuries. This provenance accounts for two twists in Marinara's tale. Because so many of the Italians who came to America were Calabrians, the region's sauces, marinara being the mother or them all, indelibly painted our collective image of Italian food blood-red. Although the tomato is not an indigenous Italian berry (notice, I didn't call it a vegetable OR a fruit), you could make a strong argument that God perfected it, albeit through violent means, with the help of Mt. Vesuvius, which looms ominously over vulnera-

ble Naples, sandwiched between the volcano's slopes and a bay less than six miles west. The local soil that has been enhanced by millenia of volcanic ash produces a plum tomato variety unique for its full, sweet taste: the San Marzano.

This would be a logical moment to declare certain marinara ingredients to be "typical," "found in most versions," "the base of a proper sauce." But, to do so would be over-codifying a definitionally non-standard thing. Some people use carrots. I don't. Some people use sugar. Not

I. Carrots, sugar...sweeteners, both. Good San Marzano tomatoes carry plenty of natural sweetness on their own thinly-skinned backs. Basil has countless advocates in the marinara community, and it lends an element of sweetness, too. I delete it, in favor of an alternative herb: oregano, with its hint of bitterness and tang. With a nod to the Bay of Naples and the sauce's name, I sneak in an ingredient that I'd swear makes my version better than any other you'll try. And there's a good chance you believe you dislike this thing that I can't do without (anchovies). Back to the issue of tomatoes: Some cooks swear by the pureed kind, denuded of lumps and seeds. I'm firmly in the opposition camp: It's whole tomatoes (imported, canned, certified San Marzano DOP) or no sauce at all. I crush them by hand, in a big bowl. And I don't bother to strain the seeds out of the resultant mess.

Marinara, and tomatoes, are acquired tastes. I hated tomatoes as a kid, and I wasn't a picky eater. I tried (and usually liked) everything. Liver. Raw oysters. Squid and octopus. Sweetbreads. Stinky cheese. But raw tomatoes (and cucumbers)? Yuck.

Landing on the "perfect" marinara has been a marathon exercise. I didn't get there until my early-50s, and it's not for lack of trying.

Disclaimer: Precise amounts and exact times are antithetical to my cooking style. Consider what follows as rough guidelines, not gospel. After many iterations, though, I am fixed on three cans of tomatoes as optimal; it's the non-negotiable quantity within my ingredient list. Perhaps, it's my embedded Catholicism and its reverence for all-things-Trinity or my amateur interior designer's affinity for the unevenness of the number "3."

3 28-ounce cans whole, peeled San Marzano tomatoes

6 cloves of garlic

Most of a yellow onion

More than ½ of a small tin of anchovies, removed from oil and patted

Between 1 tsp and 1 tbsp dried oregano

Large pinch - up to ½ tsp - crushed red pepper flakes

More olive oil than most comparable recipes would recommend (say, north of  $\frac{1}{2}$  c)

Plenty of salt

#### **EQUIPMENT**

High-sided heavy pot/pan, ideally ceramic-lined with cast-iron core (think Le Creuset), with lid

Large mixing bowl

Sharp chef's knife

Large cutting board

Wooden spoon

Pour tomato can contents in the large bowl. Roll up your sleeves and get your hands in there. Crush the tomatoes, manually, stopping short of an overworked puree. The product of your labor should be relatively uniform in its imprecision. Get it consistently lumpy, but make sure the more solid parts are all similarly small.

Chop the onion and set aside.

Peel the garlic cloves and mound them on your cutting board with

the anchovies. Mince the two components together, continuing until the mix approached a paste.

Heat the olive oil in the heavy pot, over medium-high heat. Add the onion, salt well, and stir to coat. Reduce heat to medium and saute for 7 to 10 minutes. The onion pieces will slowly yield to translucence, but don't permit them to brown. Add the garlic/anchovy paste, oregano and red pepper flakes, and cook for a minute. (Carefully) dump the tomatoes into the pot, salt a little more than your instincts try to restrain you from doing, increase the heat to high, stir well, and bring the sauce to a full boil. Take care to stir regularly to prevent the sauce from scorching at the bottom of the pot.

Having arrived at a robust boil, reduce the heat to medium-low. Stir well and allow the sauce to simmer, uncovered, for at least 15 minutes. Again, stir more, if necessary, when scorching seems an imminent risk.

Reduce heat to low and cover the pot. Simmer for 30 to 45 minutes more. Remove the lid to check the sauce's consistency. Its body should have strengthened by now, and much of the excess water should be gone. If not, simmer and stir with the lid off until you get what you want. When it's done to your satisfaction, cover or transfer to a container to rest and cool.

When I'm using the sauce the same day, I don't bother to refrigerate it. If you need to hold it overnight or longer, transfer it to a sealed container and cold store it for up to five days.





While many older adults maintain good health and are fully able to function well into their later years, there

are millions who struggle every day with health and safety challenges. According to the National Council on Aging, approximately 80 percent of seniors have at least one chronic disease and 77 percent have at least two. An older adult is treated in an emergency room for a fall every 11 seconds, while one in four experiences a mental disorder such as depression, anxiety or dementia – a number expected to double to 15 million by 2030.

It follows that more health problems require more and better healthcare. While Medicare helps defray some costs, many older Americans are left to pay for about half of their medical bills on their own. As a nation we spend 75 percent of our healthcare dollars treating chronic diseases and \$50 billion annually to treat the effects of falls.

Older adults tend to have fewer opportunities for social engagement than their younger counterparts. The most recent U.S. Census indicates 28 percent of people aged 65 and older live alone, with numbers projected to be much higher now. It's estimated that 10 percent of older Americans have suffered from at least one form of abuse – physical, psychoamounting to hundreds of thousands of cases each year.

The good news, though, is there are millions of mature Americans aging successfully, as defined by four columns essential to achieving a life well-lived: mind, body, spirit and community. Each of these columns (to be explored in depth in future articles) must be strong in order for us to live fully and suc-

**Mind:** A sharp, keen mind is a critical component of successful aging. Keeping ourselves intellectually engaged and challenged is just one of the tools needed to ward off the natural effects of growing older and the diseases that rob so many of us of our mental acuity. 



t wasn't until my mother passed away that I found her high school yearbooks and learned that she had attended the same school as Julius Boros. She was Class of 1936 and he was '37 at Roger Ludlowe High School in Fairfield, Connecticut. I don't recall her ever mentioning this fact, despite Boros' fame and hometown hero status, and the fact that her son was golf crazy. Their paths probably never crossed, as her interests led her to the Drama and French Clubs. Little did she realize that there was more tragi-comedy occurring on the fairways than ever found its way to the boards, or that more colloquial "French" phrases were uttered over missed putts than in her classroom. Even the Feral irregular foreign verbs after a wayward shot.

In high school, Boros' nickname was "MacBride." Under his senior photo is the quote, "Don't be proud." He took classes in what was called the "commercial course," and he was a member of the National Athletic Scholarship Society. Under Senior Characteristics: He is "lackadaisical;" he thinks he is "something;" he'd like to be "Tony Maneiro" [sic]; he is always seen "dragging his feet." (Tony Manero won the 1936 U.S. Open and lived in Connecticut.)

Born in 1920 to immigrant Hungarian parents, Boros' golf career spanned two eras in the professional game: the Hogan-Snead-Nelson era and the Palmer-Nicklaus-Player era. He more than held his own in both, winning

the U.S. Open in 1952 and 1963, and the P.G.A. Championship in 1968, in addition to 15 other sanctioned events. His nickname on tour was "Moose." Boros didn't turn professional until he was nearly 30. Graduating from high school in the depths of the Great

He took classes in what was called the "commercial course," and "Depression, an uncertain career in golf was probably not an option, and would have seemed utterly bizarre to his parents. The 1941 Bridgeport, Connecticut city directory has him living at home and working as a core paster for the United States Aluminum Company. In other words, he was part of the production line that made castings in a foundry. Having worked in a foundry as a summer job during college, the Feral Golfer can state that it is as close to Hell as he ever wishes to come.

Boros enlisted in the U.S. Army in October of 1941. Fortunately, he spent the next four years stateside, serving in the Air Force Medical Corps at a base in Biloxi, Mississippi, which itself can seem a living Hell in the summertime. His good fortune gave him the opportunity to continue to play golf. Upon his discharge, he returned to Fairfield and took advantage of the G.I. Bill, enrolling at the Junior College of Connecticut (now the University of Bridgeport) to study accounting. He actually worked in the field, but com-

petitive golf was his true calling.

In 1948, Boros finished second in the Connecticut Open, had the lowest U.S. Amateur qualifying score in the New York Metropolitan area, and was invited to play in the prestigious North-South Open, where he finished second, tied with Sam Snead. Snead urged him to turn pro, which Boros soon did.

Boros appeared phlegmatic and blasé on the golf course, and his swing seemed halfhearted. But he had the killer instinct that all champions possess. He denied Hogan a third consecutive Open in 1952, and took down Palmer twice, in the '63 Open and the '68 P.G.A. But I seem to have strayed from my topic.

Professional golfers play on the truest, most consistent, and best maintained greens available. In addition to their enormous talent, they have highly calibrated putters, the assistance of professional caddies, and topographical depictions of putting surfaces. Yet, despite all of these advantages, they only make about 45 percent of putts between 5 and 15 feet, less than 20 percent of putts between 15 and 25 feet, and fewer than 5 percent of putts longer than 25 feet. Nearly every putt breaks. To hole a putt, an exact congruence of line and speed is required. What does this mean for golfers who have little talent and play on greens untrue and inconsistent? Well, in the immortal words of my hometown hero, Julius Boros, it suggests "Miss 'em quick!"

Putting is more luck than skill, so just get on with it. Line it up once from behind the ball and go. Life is fleeting, folks. And you have an imminent tee shot to botch, so move along.

### St. Joseph's/Candler and Chatham Emergency Services Forge New Partnership in Pooler

St. Joseph's/Candler and Chatham Emergency Services have struck a partnership that will house ambulances at a strategic location in Pooler, improving emergency response times for the growing Pooler and West Chatham areas. Ambulances will now have a base at the St. Joseph's/Candler Urgent Care at 107 Canal Street, just off the main artery of Pooler Parkway.

St. Joseph's/Candler has been rapidly expanding in Pooler. Last year saw the opening of the first phase of the Pooler Campus, which houses a second urgent care location, near the Interstate 16 interchange with Pooler Parkway. As the new urgent care location opened, it presented an opportunity to repurpose part of the location on Canal Street for EMS use. St. Joseph's/Candler renovated about 800 square feet to provide paramedics and EMTs with quarters in that facility. Additionally, power upgrades were made on the exterior of the building and in the parking area to house up to three ambulances.

"We've had a very long relationship with Chief Kearns and Chatham Emergency Services," says St. Joseph's/Candler President and CEO Paul P. Hinchey. "When our Pooler campus opened last year, we realized that they were growing quickly as well and we could come together to create even better services for the residents of Pooler and West Chatham."

Chief Kearns agrees. "This couldn't come at a better time for Chatham EMS. The growth in the area calls for this move, but more so now with the pending construction on I-95 and I-16. Road construction and the resulting temporary closing of overpasses will make it extremely difficult to get our paramedic ambulances between some

areas of the county. We will now be able to launch ambulances from this location in Pooler, along with locations in Bloomingdale, Port Wentworth and Garden City."

supervised training opportunities for future healthcare professionals.

- Provide a convenient healthcare access point and health-screening outlet to the community in and around Beach High School, as well as target the community's uninsured and underinsured residents.
- Provide follow-up lab results, counseling and health education to participants.
- Help patients identify personal health risks and histories that may place them at risk for the development of chronic disease and associated complications, and educate them on how to reduce those risks.
- Assist participants in accessing follow-up for healthcare services.
- Enhance the active curriculum of the area's magnet school for healthcare related studies, while advancing St. Joseph's/Candler's current health training partnership.

With the newly renovated space completed and now open, the curriculum is currently

underway in preparation for a grand opening to the public in early March. The clinic will be available 20 hours a week for area residents in addition to students, staff and alumni. The screenings are free to people without insurance. All participants who receive screenings will be required to attend an onsite counseling session.

The clinic will be staffed and supervised by a St. Joseph's/Candler nurse practitioner (NP) who will assist students in improving both their hard and soft skill sets, such as lab draws, communicating results to patients, and health education. The students, under the supervision of the NP, will draw the labs, and complete the follow-up education regarding all participants' personal risk factors.

The comprehensive health screenings will include the measurement of:

- Height
- Weight

- Blood pressure
- Blood cholesterol
- Blood glucose
- Aerobic fitness

St. Joseph's/Candler and the school system have a long history of working together to give students experience in a healthcare setting. The Patient Care Technician Apprentice Program was launched a few years ago. In the program, students from Beach and Woodville-Tompkins High Schools work at least 20 hours a week providing bedside care for St. Joseph's/Candler patients.

Healthcare needs will continue to grow in the coming years, and preparing students for the high-paying healthcare workforce is a high priority for local educators and the St. Joseph's/Candler team. These collaborative programs between St. Joseph's/Candler and the school system are critical to ensure the community is well-served for the future.

edical care for our troops in combat has improved significantly over the years. Thanks to better and faster medical airlifts by helicopter - commonly called "dustoffs" - the time that elapses for a man or woman wounded in action until he or she receives emergency medical treatment continues to shorten. Medical procedures have evolved as well, leading to improved treatment outcomes and quicker recovery periods.

Despite the increase in the power of military weaponry, battlefield casualties have decreased over the decades. Casualty rates for American troops in major conflicts have steadily declined:

- Word War II 30 percent
- Vietnam 24 percent

• Iraq/ Afghanistan – 10 percent

One person directly involved with some of these medical improvements is Dr. Robert Hall. Hall graduated from Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia in 1967, and was commissioned an ensign in the Navy that summer. The following year he transitioned to active duty in the Naval Reserve as a lieutenant. For several months in 1969, he served as a medical officer aboard the USS Repose, a hospital ship cruising off the coast of South Vietnam.

Among the combatants Dr. Hall treated while serving on the Repose are three Purple Hearts recipients who paid the ultimate price:

• Ralph D. "Bucky" Hale, HMC3 USN: At age 22, Hale was killed in the Mekong Delta while engaged in a humanitarian operation to help Vietnamese civilians. He was a high school classmate of Hall's wife, Kathy, and Hall knew the Hale

• Deane F. Smith, PFC USMC: Following treatment aboard the Repose, Smith developed renal failure, and Hall volunteered to accompany him when he was medically evacuated to Clark Air Force Base in the Philippines for dialysis. Several weeks later, Hall passed through Clark on his way to his next assignment at Camp H.M. Smith in Hawaii, only to learn Smith had sadly bled to death one night.

• Melvin Lederman, Commander, USN Medical Corps: Lederman's situation was different but just as tragic. The one-time paratrooper went to medical school and became a surgeon. He and Hall served together aboard the Repose until Hall's departure. Because of his airborne experience, Lederman often went on classified missions. Just weeks before his discharge, Lederman's helicopter was shot down returning from a mission in Vietnam.

After Hall's discharge from the Navy in 1971, he began private practice as a radiologist. He has also become involved in several civic-minded endeavors. An avid skier, he was a volunteer ski patroller at





AMERICAN TRADITIONS COMPETITION the Ski Roundtop area in Pennsylvania from 1988 to 2010. He also became the regional medical advisor for the National Ski Patrol, an outdoor emergency care (OEC) instructor, and senior level advisor.

Hall is a genuine humanitarian. While skiing in Kitzbuhel, Austria, and waiting to board a cable car, the car in front of him slipped off the cable and crashed to the ground. The six passengers were thrown out into the snow. Hall immediately went to their assistance, providing emergency treatment to the skiers' injuries until the area's ski patrollers arrived.

Since his retirement in 2013, Bob and Kathy Hall have led very active lives, alternating downhill skiing in Colorado with sailing on Chesapeake Bay. Both remain very involved with veterans' affairs. He is the current intake officer and event coordinator for Pennsylvania Wounded Warriors, a charitable group providing temporary financial assistance to veterans in need in the Keystone state. He is also the co-founder of Wounded Warrior Patrol, a non-profit organization that raises money to provide free ski trips and golf outings for military personnel and their families.

Hall has cruised thousands of miles on his Harley Davidson. Many motorcyclists decorate their bikes, and putting the names of Hale, Smith and Lederman on Hall's Harley was a special way for him to honor three fallen servicemen with whom he was personally connected, privately reminiscing as he tours the countryside that is so dear to his patriotic heart.

#### Keep Him Alive

We rarely took wounded aboard at night because of the danger landing "dustoff" helicopters had in the dark to pick up wounded. On this night, we heard the blast of the bosun's whistle and the announcement made on the IMC – "Stand by to receive five wounded." It was just a simple announcement, but everyone swung into action to do their jobs without delay...

... When they arrived in pre-op, the well-oiled and coordinated machine that is Navy Medicine began its work. Everyone had a role to play and the entire scenario played out like a choreographed ballet with very little talking. One corpsman was taking X-rays, one was drawing blood, one was cutting off clothing, one was starting an IV line, one was stopping the bleeding, one was monitoring respirations and heartbeat, and on and on.... in the back of everyone's mind was the refrain – "Keep this Marine alive!"

Blood bags were hung, chest tubes inserted, antibiotics given, bleeders were clamped

off and central lines were placed – "Keep this Marine alive!"

Decisions were made about which wounded needed surgery first and who could wait his turn – and who might never get to surgery because of the devastating nature of his injuries – "Keep this Marine

The lights came on in the operating rooms and the masked and gowned nurses began to lay out their hemostats and scalpels and needle holders and retractors on trays so they could access everything instantly — "Keep this Marine alive!"

The gas-passers

(From the memoirs of Dr. Robert Hall)

checked their equipment and anesthesia and oxygen tanks and prepared to intubate their patients – "Keep this Marine alive!"

Perhaps the chaplain slipped in quietly to say a prayer over each Marine and to do his important part – "Keep this Marine alive!"

Then the heartbreaking work began in the OR – it was called "debridement" but it really meant "cut away all the dead and damaged tissue and throw it away." Blast injuries from booby traps (now called IEDs) were directed at the legs and a great fear of these young Marines was injury to the genitals. So sometimes, the hopes and dreams of that young Marine were cut away and thrown away as well – "Keep this Marine alive!"

Then, after many hours of surgery, the stumps of the amputated limbs were bandaged, the abdominal and chest incisions were sewn shut, the chest tubes were attached to suction machines and the shattered young Marines were taken to the ICU and turned over to the tender Angels of Mercy – the Navy nurses, many of whom were barely out of their teens themselves – like most of their Marine patients. Theirs was the duty of continuing the care of these wrecked young men – "Keep this Marine alive!"

Every step of the way – from medical corpsmen treating the wounded in the field – to helicopter pilots risking hostile fire to pick up the wounded – to landing pad personnel who safely guided the helicopter landing on the ship – to the Repose corpsmen and Navy nurses – at every step of the way was the mantra – "Keep this Marine alive!"

And later, when everything was done and the equipment was secured and all was quiet, the soul-searching began – Was everything possible done to accomplish our goal with these young Marines – did we keep them

But the bigger question would recur every day when some of these Marines were dealing with their pain and disabilities for the next 50 or more years – were they glad we kept them alive?


